How hot should your food be?

Different foods tend to have different pathogens living on them. Some pathogens can be more resilient than others, and may require food to be cooked to a higher temperature in order for it to be safe to consume.

What does the FDA say?

- Poultry - 165 degrees Fahrenheit
- Ground Beef - 160 degrees Fahrenheit
- Pork and Beef - 145 degrees Fahrenheit

Keep cold food cold, and hot food hot!

- Pathogens that affect humans have evolved to thrive in temperatures that fall within the same range as the body temperature of warm blooded mammals. Make sure to keep cold foods below 45 degrees Fahrenheit and above 140 degrees Fahrenheit!

Keep cooked food separate from raw food!

- Once food has been cooked and is ready to serve, make sure to keep it away from any raw food that might contaminate it.

Madison County Disease Surveillance Updates, 5/26/19-6/29/19

Communicable Diseases Reported to the Health Department: 39 (22 Chlamydia, 4 Campylobacter, 1 Babesiosis, 1 E. coli, 2 new chronic Hepatitis C, 1 Legionella, 4 Lyme, 2 Salmonella, and 2 Strep Group B)

Primary Care Providers Reported**: rash, **respiratory illness**, **gastrointestinal illness (GI)**, **allergies**, **tick bites**, coxsackie virus, upper respiratory infections (URI), sinus infections, pink eye, lice, scabies, strep throat, and coughs.

Hospital Weekly Surveillance**: **neurologic illness¹**, rash, **fever**, **respiratory illness**, **gastrointestinal illness (GI)**, and asthma

Syndromic Surveillance in Emergency Departments: 6/14 to 6/23—mild to moderate signals for neurological illness and 6/21 to 6/23—mild to moderate signals for respiratory illness

Medicaid Over-the-Counter (OTC) & Script Medication Alerts: 5/10 - 5/19—mild to moderate sensitivity for cold, cough and allergy medications; and 5/31 - 6/9 —mild to moderate sensitivity for fluoroquinolones (antibiotics)

Information denoted with an asterisk is subjective and provided on a voluntary basis. **Bolded items above were reported during at least 4 out of the 5 reporting weeks.

¹Neurologic illness can include non-specific diagnosis of neurological infection (e.g. Meningitis, Encephalitis, etc.) or non-specific conditions (e.g. headache, numbness, dizziness, blurry/double vision, speech difficulty, confusion, disorientation, or anxiety)

Mosquito Surveillance: June 1-June 28, 2019

Mosquitoes from the Town of Sullivan are collected and submitted weekly for testing to detect mosquito-borne diseases that may pose a threat to human health. The two primary disease of local concern are West Nile Virus (WNV) and Eastern Equine Encephalitis (EEE).
