

Definitions of services provided

Advocacy: The provision of active support to a disabled person and/or their family. Usually involves helping a consumer (person or family) plead their needs or cause in the areas of continuing service.

Alcohol and Substance Abuse Services: Services provided to individuals and families who are affected by serious abuse of alcohol and/or other substances.

Counseling: The provision of support and advice through face-to-face conversations and discussions. Usually provided by personnel trained to provide such services, and frequently provided by professional counselors (family counseling, substance abuse counseling, employment counseling, school counseling, credit counseling, etc.).

Daycare/Day habilitation: Provision of care to the disabled person away from home during daytime hours. There is an emphasis on life skills and life planning and help with life in general.

Evaluation: Typically refers to the clinical/professional assessment of a person and his/her disability. The focus of these assessments or evaluations is often to determine a person's eligibility for services. However, evaluation can also help in identifying specific needs for services.

Family Support Services: Services geared to assisting families in coping with the stressors associated with having a person with disabilities in the home.

Health Services: These are traditionally services related to health, nutrition and wellness, provided by physicians, nurses, dieticians and other health professionals.

Mental Health Services: These are traditionally services geared to the treatment of mental illness or related disorders.

Parent Training Services: Services, provided directly to primary care providers (e.g. parents), intended to give them skills or enhance their skills in managing, teaching or training their disabled children.

Referral: Services geared to helping disabled persons and/or their families access appropriate services by facilitating the necessary paperwork and contacts. Usually included in Case Management or Service Coordination.

Respite: Relief provided to primary care providers, allowing them to get a break from the continuous care of the disabled person. A substitute care provider provides this relief. It can be provided either in the natural home or in an alternative setting, and can last for a few hours to several days.

Service Coordination: The provision of specialized case management services by trained personnel. Service coordination is a service that assists the person with a developmental disability and his or her advocate (family) to create and maintain a service environment.

The Service Coordinator achieves this outcome by developing, implementing, reviewing and revising an Individualized Service

Plan. The Service Coordinator works in partnership with consumers to enable them to live and participate in the community according to their personal goals, preferences, and needs.

Therapies: Direct clinical interventions intended to treat or reduce dysfunction associated with physical or mental disorders. Such services are usually provided by occupational therapists, physical therapists, speech therapists, psychiatrists, psychologists or social workers, and can be offered to the disabled person or to their families (family therapy).

Transition: This refers to services to help the disabled person or their primary care providers plan for, and successfully negotiate a movement from one stream of services to another. Generally, transition services focus on the critical transition from pre-school services to school-age services or from school-age services to adult/community services.

Transportation: The actual provision of transportation services, via cars, taxis, vans or buses operated by the provider agency.
