Beaver Creek & Brookfield RR

Beaver Creek State Forest and Brookfield Railroad State Forest are part of the Brookfield Trail System (see #7 Charles E. Baker State Forest as well). These three forests collectively provide 13,750 acres of public reforestation lands for multiple recreation purposes with trails suited for hikers, mountain bikers, cross-country skiers and equestrians. Brookfield Railroad State Forest is approximately 850 acres and is named for the railroad line that was designed to connect the Villages of Brookfield to North Brookfield and the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western Railroad back in the late 1800's. The trail is 4.3 miles. Beaver Creek State Forest is approximately 3,484 acres with 25 miles of trails. With Beaver Creek passing right through, the forest is also great for fishing and canoeing. The area is also open to hunting. Wildlife of all kinds abound within the area including beaver, waterfowl, turkey, deer and occasional sighting of black bear.

Nichols Pond Park

Nichols Pond Park is a 45 acre County Park that features short nature trails for hiking and winter activities. The area was once the site of an Oneida Indian Village and is recognized as the battleground of the 1615 Champlain Battle. The park consists of woodland, wetland and open lawn. An observation deck overlooks the wetland habitat. Two open pavilions and picnic sites with tables and grills are also available as well as two restroom facilities with a solar powered water system.
